


The following notes are to accompany the video "Music Coding for Everyone."

'<u>Clapping Music</u>' by Steve Reich animated on YouTube.


Outcomes:

- 1. An understanding of how code terms apply to music listening, creating and performing.
- 2. The creation or re:creation of musical works through the application of good musicianship and coding principles.
- 3. Learn how to code using Minecraft Education edition and Sonic Pi.
